



Direct staff to submit the Count Question Resolution Challenge for the 2010
Census population counts to the U.S. Census Bureau.

This report is organized into two sections; including first a summary of the 2010
Census data release as of September 9, 2011 and a discussion on the Census
Count Question Resolution process.

I. 2010 Census

During the spring of 2011, the U.S. Census Bureau began releasing data collected during the 2010 Decennial Census.

History

The Census collects and analyzes various sets of data on the population of the United States at a particular point in time. The first National Census was taken in 1790 and has been taken every ten years since. Although data collection, technology and information have changed throughout history, the general purpose of the Census has remained the same, intended to gather detailed information about the population and characteristics of the people of the United States of America at a particular point in time and place. The Census Bureau also gathers data and creates forecasts to help predict changes in the population of particular areas like the American Community Survey, Puerto Rico Community Survey, Economic Census, Population Estimates Program, and the Annual Economic Survey.

Use of Data

Census data is used in various ways. The official U.S. Census is described in Article I, Section 2 of the Constitution of the United States. It calls for an actual enumeration of the people every ten years, to be used for apportionment of seats in the House of Representatives among the states. The County of Santa Barbara uses Census counts to help draw boundaries for their Board of Supervisors legislative districts, which are required to have fairly equal population counts. Many local agencies and districts use Census data to analyze potential participants in programs, estimate needs of particular groups and to develop forecasting of future trends to help plan and develop strategies for land use and transportation.

The Census is also used to help allocate many forms of monetary resources from the Federal, State and local level government. For example, each year nationwide nearly \$400 billion dollars is allocated based on Census data. Many services and government programs are designed using Census information on statistics related to employment, income, education, ethnicity, age, and disabilities. For example, many workforce training programs are funded based on unemployment levels of a particular region.

In Carpinteria, many social service and housing program funding sources may be impacted by local Census counts and estimates. State and local allocation of funds for programs like Food Stamps, Section 8 Housing Vouchers, National School Lunch Program, Head Start, State Children's Insurance, Women's, Infant and Children (WIC) Program, Foster Care, and School Breakfast Program are all impacted by allocations dependant on Census population counts.

The City of Carpinteria allocates HOME and CDBG funds from the federal department of Housing and Urban Development. Last year the City allocated a total of \$194,295 through these programs which are both directly impacted by population

counts. These funds are awarded to programs that provide affordable housing, social services, and various programs to help the impoverished, homeless, and children. Other funding sources, supporting the Parks and Recreation Department, are sporadically offered through bond and grant programs from the State. For example, in the past Proposition 12 and 40 supported the construction of such parks facilities as the Viola Fields, Viola Fields Restrooms and the replacement of the community pool filtration system. These bonds and grant programs are allocated based on a per capita rate and are therefore impacted by Census counts.

The City of Carpinteria Department of Public Works receives funding from a wide variety of sources. The sources include allocations from the State of California, regional tax measures, local taxes and fees, and grants. Some or all portions of each of these allocations are often based on population. The Highway User Tax, an excise tax collected by the State on gasoline sales, is distributed by a formula to Cities and Counties based on several factors including population. The Measure A Regional Sales Tax Measure in Santa Barbara County allocates funding based on a capital project expenditure plan that includes a portion distributed to the County and Cities based on population. For example, Measure A funds would be reduced by approximately \$50,000 based on the City's drop in population from 2000 to 2010. State and Federal Public Works Transportation funding, in particular, is distributed to the regional Metropolitan Planning Organizations/Transportation Planning Agencies (MPO/TPA). The MPO/TPA (Santa Barbara County Association of Governments) often then distributes the State and federal funding by policy agreements and/or by population to the County and Cities. Many grants from State and federal sources are distributed by population. Recently, the local transportation maintenance grants under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) were distributed to the federal MPOs. In Santa Barbara County, the funding was then allocated to the County and Cities exclusively by population.

Although social and civic service funding sources can be highly impacted by Census data, Census data can impact many other areas of non-governmental life. Businesses, of all shapes and sizes, use Census data to help make informed business decisions. For example, firms may use data to determine market demands related to opening a new business in a particular area or where to place marketing. Businesses may use Census data to drive hiring patterns. Lenders and banks may use Census data to evaluate financial risk or investment planning. Generally, Census data is one of the most widely used data sources that is consistently referenced across the Country.

2010 Census Process

The 2010 Decennial Census kicked off on April 1, 2010. Throughout the spring and summer of 2010, mailed surveys were collected from residents throughout the Country. The City of Carpinteria had a Mail Participation Rate of 78%, above both the National rate of 74% and the State of California rate of 73%¹. The Mail Participation Rates are the percentage of Census forms mailed back by households that received them in any particular geography. For those households that failed to return forms by mail, Census

Enumerators gathered data in the field. Census employees walked door to door, during May, June and July, collecting surveys and determining population information for households that did not respond.

The 2010 Census consisted of a short survey, consisting of 10 questions. The Census tag line was "10 Questions, 10 Minutes". The survey was simplified to basic population characteristics that relate to most households, including household size, family orientation, gender, age, occupancy/tenancy, Hispanic origin, and race. The Census changed the survey to a simplified format to encourage higher rates of participation and more accurate data collection. Separate longer surveys were distributed for the American Community Survey, which included more detailed demographic information like income and benefits, occupation, commute, housing type and age, disabilities, health insurance, veteran status and education.

The Census aims to count people in the place where they have usual residence. The place of usual residence is the place where you live most often or most of the time. For some, usual residence is more difficult to determine, like homeless persons, children living in a shared custody household, snowbirds, college students, etc. If someone is unable to determine their usual residence, where they live the majority of the time, they may have been counted where they resided on the date April 1, 2010. When a person lives in a group living facility, like a group home or a shelter, they are counted as living in a particular location on April 1, 2010. Persons, without a normal residence, may be counted at a location where they may have been on April 1, like a soup kitchen or a park. Persons that may live in transitory locations, like a hotel, motel or a campground, would have been counted at the specific location where they stayed on the date of April 1, 2010.

Data Release

Starting in the spring of 2011, the Census Bureau began releasing data from the 2010 Census. The first files consisted of data needed for redistricting purposes, which included population totals, housing occupancy, race and ethnicity. In May 2011, additional demographic information was released for more detailed population and housing characteristics. In the summer of 2011 detailed race characteristics were released. To date, data is available for Carpinteria at Place, Census Tract and Census Block levels for population count, housing unit count, housing occupancy and tenure, age, race, gender, and family relationship. The Census has scheduled the release of all future data and statistical information over the next two years. (The 2010 Census Data Products: Release Date Chart is attached as Exhibit A.)

Data

In summary, the 2010 Census data released to date helps to describe the changes that have taken place in Carpinteria since the 1990 and 2000 Census' and help us to predict trends as we move into the future. Staff has compiled a report to summarize the data available for the City of Carpinteria at this time. The report titled "2010 Census Data Report: Carpinteria", is included as Exhibit B. This report is a draft and is expected to be updated should the City receive revised Census counts in response to the challenge. The report does not intend to analyze the data or speculate on its overall accuracy.

Data Accuracy

The data released over the last few months has been reviewed at the State, Regional and Local level for accuracy and relevance. The Santa Barbara County Association of Governments released the "2010 Census Overview"² which summarized the data released by the end of May 2011 for the County and Places within Santa Barbara County. In the County of Santa Barbara, the City of Carpinteria incurred the greatest loss of population. The Census identified a population decrease of 8% in the City of Carpinteria, followed next by Solvang with a drop of 2% and a 1% reduction in the City of Santa Barbara. This statistic is important when the County and the State generally have been experiencing population growth.




Figure 1 - 2011 County of Santa Barbara Redistricting by Block Population (San Roque and Rancho Granada MHP)

Mapping analysis, done by the County of Santa Barbara for Redistricting of Supervisorial boundaries, identified locations in the City of Carpinteria where housing units or population appeared to be missing or inaccurate. City staff, reviewing the Block level population counts also found that many blocks showed zero populations, where known populations existed on April 1, 2010. Figure 1 exemplifies one such area where various Blocks were identified with a "0" noting a zero population over the majority of the San Roque Mobile and Rancho Granada Home Parks. The two Census Blocks, covering the parks, show a population count total of 272. There are a total of 256 units in the two parks. If the City's average household size is 2.74 then would be an expected population of approximately 700 persons for this area. This issue has been identified on various other blocks in the City of Carpinteria.

While research has proven to identify possible under counts in population, some Blocks were found to identify populations where no known housing units are located. For example, the Block groups which exist atop Monte Vista Park (Block 1004 and 1006) show a population where no known housing units exist. While these anomalies in data cannot be confirmed, their accuracy raises concerns as to overall accuracy and relevance.

Count Question Resolution

The Census Bureau's 2010 Census Count Question Resolution (CQR) Program provides State, Local and tribal officials or their designated representatives the opportunity to challenge the Census counts of housing units and group quarters. The

Census Bureau will make corrections on the basis of appropriate documentation provided by the challenging government units and through research of official 2010 Census records at the Census Bureau. Challenges can be made based on one of three criteria; first, based on a boundary error on the legal boundary of a jurisdiction, second, based on a geocoding error where housing units would be incorrectly assigned to the wrong jurisdiction, and third, based on coverage errors where housing units were incorrectly excluded or included in the data compilations.

In order to submit a challenge to the Census, the City must submit specific documentation and specify the type of dispute to be made. The documentation includes mapping and data tables that show the location of a particular challenge and include a tabulated chart referring to addresses, block and track number. Staff has compiled these documents, as formatted by the Census, for 47 blocks in Carpinteria where housing units are potentially missing or incorrectly counted. Staff will provide a complete sample of the submittal documents at the meeting. Example documents are provided as Exhibit C. Challenges may be submitted no later than June 1, 2013.

As part of the submittal of a Count Question Resolution challenge, the highest elected official must submit the request, in writing, to make the challenge. Staff has prepared a letter, to be signed by the mayor, which will be submitted with the challenge documents to the Census Bureau. The draft letter from the Mayor is attached as Exhibit D.

II. ACTION OPTIONS

1. Authorize submittal, via letter under the Mayor's signature, of a Count Resolution submittal (Exhibit D), and submittal of the related Count Resolution Challenge documents. (staff's recommendation)
2. Direct staff to modify the letter from the Mayor to sign for the Count Resolution submittal (Exhibit D) and submittal of the Count Resolution Challenge documents and return to the City Council for further consideration.
3. Deny the action to submit the Challenge as proposed.

This report provides a summary of the 2010 Census data released as of August 9, 2011 for the City of Carpinteria. The first files released for redistricting purposes includes population totals, housing occupancy and Hispanic/Latino characteristics. Additional demographic information has been released since May 2011, which included detailed race, population counts, housing unit counts, housing occupancy and tenure, age, gender, and family relationships. Data is currently available for Carpinteria for the Place, Census Tract and the Census Block levels of data analysis. This report includes summary charts and tables using the 2010 Census data.

The following report has been restricted to the jurisdictional boundary of the City of Carpinteria. The report does not include neighboring unincorporated areas. As new data becomes available, more detailed data analysis can be done to understand more detailed demographic trends and changes in the community.



Population

The 2010 Census data indicates that the population of the City of Carpinteria has decreased 8% since 2000, decreasing from 14,194 to 13,040. Chart 1 below shows the increase in population between the 1990 and 2000 Census of 4%. In general, the County of Santa Barbara and most jurisdictions within its boundaries experienced general population growth.



Housing Units

The 2010 Census showed not only a decline in population but also a decline in overall housing units. Since 2000, Carpinteria housing unit counts have declined from 5,464 to 5,429, or a decline of one percent. In contrast, countywide the general trend has been increasing housing unit counts.




Chart 2—City of Carpinteria Housing Unit Counts http://factfinder.census.gov/home/saff/aff_transition.html

Household and Family Size

The 2010 average household and family size has stayed relatively consistent, dropping only slightly since the 2000 Census. The Household classification measures all groups living in the same household,, including unmarried partners and room-mates, while the Family classification only measure those living together that are related by legal marriage, blood relation or other legal bond like adoption.



Housing Unit Vacancy

Housing tenure and vacancy rates can be used to track economic fluctuations and changes in jobs housing balance communities. Chart 4 shows that the percentage of housing units vacant has increased since both the 1990 and 2000 Census'. The 2010 Census indicates a vacancy rate of 12.4% for the City of Carpinteria, higher than both the 9.3% vacancy in 1990 and 8.7% vacancy in 2000. The City of Carpinteria (12.4%) and City of Solvang (12.6%) show higher vacancy rates than other jurisdictions in the County of Santa Barbara (range 4.1%-8.5%).




Chart 4—Housing Unit Occupancy and Vacancy Rates http://factfinder.census.gov/home/saff/aff_transition.html

Rental vs. Owner Occupancy

The City of Carpinteria has typically had a proportionally higher owner occupied housing stock than rentals. In 2010, the housing stock became more renter occupied than in both 1990 and 2000 Census'. Chart 5 shows that the rental occupancy makes up 50.7% of all occupied housing units.



Vacant Housing Status

Housing vacancy is based on various causes, including properties available for rent or sale, properties between new owners or new tenants, seasonal or recreational use, etc. In 2010, the number of seasonal or recreational properties increased by 235% since 2000. While these seasonal uses increased, the amount of units vacant for rental or sales purposes decreased in 2010.



Hispanic or Latino Origin

The City of Carpinteria has experienced a growing rate of its population that identifies as having a Hispanic or Latino Origin. In 2010, the Census showed that the population 48.7% of its total population identified as Hispanic or Latino Origin. As shown in Chart 4, the percentage of Hispanic or Latino Origin population has grown. Hispanic or Latino Origin is a self identified ethnic origin quality not considered the same as Race.



Age

In the 2010 Census, the City of Carpinteria had a median age of 39.5 years. Chart 5 shows the highest concentrated age groups between 25 and 54 years. On the following pages, the age charts for 1990 and 2000 can be used to compare the changes in the age group populations in the City of Carpinteria. In general, the most dramatic changes in age demographics relate to smaller groups including the youth and older populations as shown in Charts 9 and 10.




Chart 8—City of Carpinteria by Age 2010 Census http://factfinder.census.gov/home/saff/aff_transition.html




Chart 9—City of Carpinteria by Age 2000 Census http://factfinder.census.gov/home/saff/aff_transition.html





Chart 10—City of Carpinteria by Age 1990 Census http://factfinder.census.gov/home/saff/aff_transition.html



Age Group Changes

Age Group Changes

As populations change, the age demographic becomes an important tool to analyze and plan for services, programs and fiscal impacts. Chart 12 shows that the age group of 85 years and older has increased by 59%, a group typically found to live alone and be more dependent on social services. Chart 13 shows that the youth population has been generally declining in the age groups of 14 and under. In Carpinteria, trends identified by the Carpinteria Unified School District support these reductions in school age children in their schools.





BASIC FACTS

SCOPE:

The Census Bureau's 2010 Census Count Question Resolution (CQR) Program provides state, local, and tribal officials, or their designated representatives, in the United States and Puerto Rico a process to challenge the census counts of housing units and group quarters.

The Census Bureau will make corrections on the basis of appropriate documentation provided by the challenging governmental units and through research of official 2010 Census records at the Census Bureau.

The 2010 CQR corrections are based on housing and population counts as of April 1, 2010, and geographic boundaries in place in the United States and Puerto Rico as of January 1, 2010. The Census Bureau will not add living quarters that did not exist in the 2010 Census universe.

The 2010 CQR Program is not a mechanism or process to challenge or revise the population counts sent to the President by December 31, 2010, which are used to apportion the U.S. House of Representatives. The Census Bureau will not make any changes to the apportionment, redistricting counts, or official 2010 Census data products.

THREE TYPES OF CHALLENGES ACCEPTED BY THE CQR PROGRAM

Boundary Challenges correct inaccurate reporting or recording of boundaries legally in effect on January 1, 2010.

Geocoding Challenges correct the placement of living quarters and associated population within the correct governmental unit boundaries and 2010 census tabulation blocks.

Coverage Challenges add or delete specific living quarters and people associated with them, identified during the census process, but erroneously included as duplicates or excluded due to processing errors.

IT'S IN OUR HANDS

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS:

- 1. What is the Count Question Resolution (CQR) Program?**

The 2010 CQR Program is the mechanism for state, local, or tribal officials of governmental units in the United States and Puerto Rico to challenge the 2010 Census counts of housing units and group quarters.
- 2. When can I submit a CQR challenge?**

The 2010 CQR Program will accept challenges beginning June 1, 2011, and ending with challenges that are postmarked, faxed, or e-mailed by June 1, 2013. The Census Bureau will review challenges in the order received.
- 3. Who can submit a CQR challenge?**

The Census Bureau will only accept challenges from the highest elected or appointed official of state, local, and tribal area governmental units or those representing them or acting on their behalf.
- 4. Where can I submit a CQR challenge?**

All 2010 CQR challenges must be submitted through the mail or electronically to the CQR Program staff at Census Bureau headquarters. The addresses are on the back panel of this brochure.
- 5. What documentation is required for a CQR challenge?**

The Census Bureau requires specific documentation before committing resources to investigate a challenge. The submitted challenges must specify whether the challenge disputes the location of a governmental unit boundary, the location or number of housing units and/or group quarters counts in one or more 2010 census tabulation blocks, or both.

Maps must identify the state, county, 2010 census tracts, and 2010 census tabulation blocks associated with the challenge.

WHICH GOVERNMENTAL UNITS ARE ELIGIBLE TO SUBMIT A 2010 Census Count Question Resolution (CQR) CHALLENGE?

- States and statistically equivalent entities can submit challenges for their state or equivalent, plus any counties or equivalent entities, minor civil divisions, incorporated places (including consolidated cities), state designated tribal statistical areas, state-recognized American Indian Reservations, Hawaiian Home Lands, and (in Hawaii and Puerto Rico only) census designated places within their jurisdiction. Puerto Rico may also submit challenges for sub-minor civil divisions.
- Counties and statistically equivalent entities can submit challenges for their county or equivalent entity plus any minor civil divisions, incorporated places, and (in Hawaii and Puerto Rico

- only) census designated places within their jurisdiction. Municipalities in Puerto Rico may also submit challenges for sub-minor civil divisions.
- Actively functioning minor civil divisions can submit challenges for their minor civil division plus any incorporated place within their jurisdiction.
- Incorporated places (including consolidated cities) can submit challenges for their place.
- Federally-recognized American Indian tribes can submit challenges for American Indian reservations or off-reservation trust lands,

- tribal designated statistical areas, and Oklahoma tribal statistical areas, plus any American Indian tribal subdivisions within their jurisdiction.
- Alaska Native Regional Corporations can submit challenges for their regional corporation and for Alaska Native Village statistical areas (ANVSAs) within their jurisdiction.
- Alaska Native Village statistical areas can submit challenges for their ANVSA.

If a challenge involves an American Indian reservation or off-reservation trust land, the maps must identify the American Indian area and census tabulation block boundary.

The following is a list of acceptable maps:

- 2010 Census Public Law 94-171 County Block Maps.
- 2010 Census County Block Maps, Maps derived from 2010 TIGER/Line shapefiles, and
- Other maps or GIS data showing Census Bureau 2010 tabulation block numbers and boundaries.

Address lists of housing units and/or group quarters located in the challenged areas are also required.

Acceptable address lists include:

- City-Style Address Lists,
- Non-City-Style Address Lists, and
- Group Quarters Address Lists.

The Census Bureau requests that challengers use one or more of the address list templates provided on the 2010 CQR Web site, as appropriate, when submitting challenge documentation. In addition, mark the exact location of each challenged address on a map containing 2010 census tract and tabulation block(s).

2010 CENSUS COUNT RESOLUTION PROGRAM (CQR) CHALLENGE RESULTS

- The Census Bureau will notify all affected governmental units of any corrections to their official counts as a result of a CQR Program decision.

- Corrections made to the population and housing unit counts by this program will result in the issuance of new official 2010 Census counts to the officials of governmental units affected.
- Governmental units may use CQR corrections for future programs requiring official 2010 Census data. The Census Bureau will use the CQR corrections to:
 - Modify the 2010 Census file for use in annual postcensal estimates beginning in December 2012, and
 - Create errata and make it available on the American FactFinder.
- The Census Bureau will not incorporate the CQR corrections into any 2010 Census data products.

Dear Census Bureau;

On behalf of the City of Carpinteria, its council, staff and public, I am writing to request consideration from the Count Question Resolution Office regarding the housing and population counts of the 2010 Census. As Mayor, I am the highest elected official and make this request to certify that the data included in the request is valid.

The City requests that your Office consider the evaluation of the attached maps and data files for which our staff has found housing or population counts from the 2010 Census that appear to be in error.

Many of the blocks identified by staff are located within Mobile Home Parks. During the Census period, City staff received many comments from residents within the Mobile Home Parks that were concerned that they had not received Census Questioners in the mail. Staff worked with local Census staff to determine if errors had occurred and were reassured that these parks would be counted by enumerators in the field if questionnaires were not received in a normal fashion. Upon review of 2010 Census data released earlier this year, staff determined that the block level data for many of these Mobile Home Park blocks included zero population and housing unit counts. It would seem that some error occurred in the data collection for these Blocks and should be corrected. Attached please find the paper and electronic copies of the associated Count Question Resolution Challenge maps and data files.

Staff included many blocks that identify population that would otherwise appear to be incorrect. For these blocks, some include industrial uses, vacant parcels, City Parks, and school facilities, where no permitted or known residences exist. For these Blocks, the data files indicate the known use of the block and why staff would have anticipated a zero population or housing unit count. We request that the populations and housing unit counts be verified as they may have been incorrectly counted from neighboring blocks. Staff has also included aerial map images of these blocks to clarify their location and uses.

Staff also worked to identify blocks that generally appeared to show a lower than expected population based on known housing units. We are also concerned that the City of Carpinteria's population dropped an estimated 8% when most neighboring communities show general increases. The City of Carpinteria is a small community and a decline of 8% is dramatic and has many implications which affect our low income populations, funding of services and other programs based on Census data. Due to these concerns, we respectfully request your full consideration in this request.
